Surface Water Supply Setback Variances

Claire Golden

Surface Water Supply Setbacks 310 CMR 15.211(1)

Resource	Septic Tank/ D-Box/STU	SAS
Surface Water Supply (SWS)	400	400
Tributary to SWS	200	200
Wetlands Bordering SWS or Tributary to SWS	100	100

Upgrades Near SWSs

- Local Upgrade Approval [310 CMR 15.405(1)(e)] permits setback reductions for BVW without restrictions for those abutting SWS or tributaries thereto
- Local Upgrade Approval [310 CMR 15.405(1)(g)] permits upgrades as close as 100 feet to:
 - Surface Water Supplies
 - Tributaries to Surface Water Supplies
- If LUA is not applicable (< 100 ft to SWS, tributary to SWS):</p>
 - Variance from MassDEP is required
 - BOH cannot grant such a variance

SWS Setback Variances

- 310 CMR 15.411(5) permits variance approval:
 - Some exceptions (Quabbin, Wachusett & Ware);
 - Water supplier consultation;
 - ≥ 200 ft to SWS and/or ≥ 100 ft to tributary to SWS; and
 - No MassDEP review required but copy MassDEP on variance approval
- Upgrade/Repair (< 100 to SWS, tributary):</p>
 - BOH <u>cannot</u> approve this variance (310 CMR 15.411(5));
 - Only MassDEP can approve this variance; and
 - WP59c application to MassDEP regional office:
 - Water supplier consultation is preferred to be included
 - MassDEP will consult with the Drinking Water Program

Commercial Kitchens

Brian Dudley

Can waste from commercial kitchens discharge to a Title 5 system?

- Loose definition of "commercial kitchen"
 - Any food preparation facility for purposes other than cooking domestic meals for a single family home or group home or other similar circumstance.
- Why is it an issue?
 - Most food commercial food preparation activities generate wastewater with strength greater than household sanitary wastewater.
 - Accounted for in flow rates for restaurants, fast food, etc.

Can waste from commercial kitchens discharge to a Title 5 system?

- Many BoHs are seeing requests for home-based food preparation/manufacturing enterprises
 - This activity can generate higher strength waste than can be accommodated by a T5 system designed for single family use.
- These requests must be reviewed by MassDEP pursuant to WP70 application

Reporting Requirements for I/A Approvals

- MassDEP has designated Barnstable County as its agent to receive monitoring data and inspection reports for all Piloting and Provisional Use I/A Approvals
- Submittal of this information will be by the I/A system Certified Operator to the Barnstable Septic Management Program's IA Tracking Database: https://septic.barnstablecountyhealth.org/
- MassDEP will be notifying those with Site Piloting Approvals in April 2021. Requirement for Site Piloting sites to start submittals to Barnstable's database by July 1, 2021
- Notification to the Provisional Use Technologies will follow (no schedule yet)
- BOHs can register to view data for systems in their town

I/A System Failures

- DEP is requesting Boards of Health notify DEP via email of I/A system failures
- Information sent should include:
 - Type of I/A system
 - Age of system
 - Location of System
 - Known details/Reason for failure (if known)
